MESSAGE FROM

THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back for Term 5 of this academic year. I trust you all had a good Easter break.

This week we were delighted to finally receive our final OFSTED report following our inspection that happened back in March. I have written to all parents / carers separately today to share the details of the report. If you have seen that email you will know that it is a very positive report which rightly celebrates so many good things that happen here at Holcombe every day. They recognised most importantly of all that "the schools motto of 'Transforming Life Chances' is reflected in all that the school does" and that students "experience an inclusive, welcoming and supportive environment and are proud to attend their Rights Respecting School". These are only two highlights from the report and I would encourage all of you to read the letter that went out today and/or read the report in full.

At the end of next week our Year 13 students will complete their last full day of school before study leave starts and then they will start sitting their final A Level examinations. Year 11 will commence study leave early the following week. We know how hard these students have worked over the past 2 years and we wish them every success in their A level and GCSE examinations. As I have been saying in assemblies this week, here at Holcombe we 'believe we can' and I really do urge all of our Year 11 and Year 13 students to 'believe you can' in the remaining weeks. Once study leave begins I would encourage all of our Year 11 and 13 students to contact someone here if we can help in any way.

In the spirit of 'believing we can', on Monday we celebrated 'Earth Day' and some students have completed tasks linked to this. As a society we face some significant challenges to better look after our natural environment and we all need to 'believe we can' make a difference. Recycling our glass and paper, for example, may seem a very small gesture but if millions of people do it then it makes a huge difference.

Finally may I ask for your support with 3 things, which I know I have raised previously but unfortunately we are still having some issues here:

- 1. **Uniform**. The Uniform code is well known and students are familiar with what is and is not acceptable. As summer gets here we start to see more students in trainers and without blazers. If the weather does heat up and if we do get some exceptionally hot days (which seems a long way off at the moment does it not!) then of course we will relax our blazer and tie rules. But for now all students should continue to wear the correct uniform. Parents and carers can help here by ensuring they leave for school with the correct uniform
- 2. **Behaviour on public transport**. We have enjoyed very positive meetings with staff from local bus and train companies who are increasingly working in partnership with us. We know that the vast majority of our students act responsibly on the way to and from school, but sadly a small minority can at times ruin the schools reputation by acting in unacceptable ways. We will be clamping down on this by working ever more closely with local travel companies so please do ensure you son/daughter is aware of the expectations
- 3. **Parking.** I met with a group of local residents this week who put up with all sorts of issues living, as they do, so close to a school. They all accept that there will be more traffic at certain times and that sometimes students will drop litter etc, but some of what our residents are having to tolerate is beyond what it is acceptable. Some parents/carers are it seems parking across driveways and even parking on driveways in some cases whilst waiting for their son/daughter to leave school. May I please just ask, again, for all of us to be more considerate of our neighbours when picking up / dropping off children

Finally I wanted to thank those parents who met with us last night re: setting up a new PTA. This group will work in the coming months and years to raise funds for the school which can then be spent on a range of things to improve the daily experiences here for our students. We will be advertising this new PTA in a future blog.

Thank you for your ongoing support. I will provide a further update in 2 weeks time.

KENT, SURREY AND SUSSEX AIR AMBULANCE VISIT



Last Friday three Year 12 Students from the Captain's Team accompanied Mr Phillips the Head of Biology to Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance charity based at Rochester Airport. This was to support launch of their competition to `Name Your Local Air Ambulance'. This is a competition for schools and youth groups as part of the 'KSS Buy it for Life' urgent appeal, which is calling on everyone across Kent, Surrey and Sussex to help raise the final £1M to purchase, instead of lease, its second helicopter by the end of May which would save the charity around £500K a year. This will enable KSS to fly for six more hours a day, meaning its specialist lifesaving crews can reach more patients and save even more lives. This charity has a very personal connection to Mr Phillips as in November 2020 they assisted in attending to a sudden critical illness he suffered which helped save his life. SIXTH FORM THORPE PARK TRIP






MATHS CLUB



This week in Maths Club, students were introduced to an application of the Travelling Salesman Problem. In the problem, the mathematicians were given the distances between 4 major cities in the UK and were tasked with finding the shortest route that visited each city once, starting and ending at London. The mathematicians set about solving this by listing the different combinations and sure enough several of them were in fact able to find the shortest route through applying logical reasoning and problem solving, but is there a more efficient and certain way, guaranteed to not miss any routes? To find the answer to this, over the next week or two, students will have to develop their knowledge of graph theory. In particular, students will be looking into Hamiltonian circuits... Interestingly, mathematicians have not yet found any sort of criterion for determining whether a graph contains a Hamiltonian circuit or not. If there were criterion, it would help substantially with many other mathematical problems. Maybe there are criterion for proving this, and maybe it will be a student from Holcombe Grammar School who will find them?
