Class Charts Reminder

Many thanks to all parents who are able to let us know in detail why students are late or absent from school, please continue to do so by 8am on each day of absence. We have made some changes to our absence reporting. We now expect all lateness and absence to be reported through our classcharts software, this is to enable swift and accurate processing of this information, as well as removing the need for you to confirm voice messages with written evidence. Through classcharts, written reasons can be sent directly to our attendance office, and medical evidence can be attached directly where appropriate.

If you access your child's profile on classcharts, you will see the Absences. Selecting this tab will display a list of absences that you have reported, once you have reported them. This includes when the absence took place, the reason for the absence and who acknowledged your absence report.

To report an absence, click on the Report new absence button. Next, enter the details of the reported absence into the form provided. You can also include up to 5 files in your absence report as supporting evidence. To do this, click on the Attach supporting evidence button and select the files of your choice. Click on the Submit button to send your pupil's absence report to their school. The absence can be edited and deleted until it has been acknowledged by a member of school staff.

This can also be used to report lateness too.



Attendance and Punctuality

We would like to remind parents that is their responsibility for their child to attend school every day the school is open, except in a small number of allowable circumstances such as being too ill to attend or being given permission for an absence in advance from the school.

It is equally as important for their child to be punctual and attend school on time. Registration opens at 08:40am, if a child is late before registration closes at 09:00am, a 30 minute detention will be given. If a child is late after registration has closed at 09:00am, a 1 hour detention will be given. We are constantly reviewing this system in order to find ways to encourage greater punctuality.

We understand that lateness can sometimes be due to unforeseen circumstances, and those will be taken into consideration. However, pre-warned train/ bus strikes and ongoing road works are not an unforeseen circumstance, and adjustments to travel plans should be made prior to the journey to allow for expected delays.

By attending school consistently and punctually, we are setting our students up to be their best selves, thank you so much for your ongoing support in achieving this with them.


- 8-10 students from each form will be involved in each activity, meaning that the vast majority of students will be participating in one competition, so no lessons will take place for that year group.

Last week, Year 7 took part in their dedicated Thinking Week, each period 1, Monday to Thursday. They enjoyed sessions on:


- Growth Mindset and Be Your Best Self (BYBS)

- Thinking Maps



Apprenticeship Degree Pathways with alumni Lauren Cook

Year 13s had the opportunity to learn from the experiences of Lauren Cook, who is successfully midway through an Apprenticeship Degree in Project Management, with Atkins UK. Lauren studied A level Psychology, Sociology and Geography at Holcombe, she kindly shared her experiences post A levels to inspire and support our current year 13s. A few examples of the feedback from the session below demonstrate the value of such engagement:

.."It was really useful to be able to hear one person's own experiences and the whole process for apprenticeships. Learning the extra tips was especially useful when beginning the application process and knowing what to expect in the coming months"

.."The session was valuable as it changed my perspective of apprenticeship degrees and how beneficial it is, even if I want to go into a career in healthcare. I now am going to email certain companies to investigate such opportunities!. (Ore O)

.."Lauren's talk encouraged me to apply for an apprenticeship degree as her personal experience has some similarities to the career path I want to take. She was very interactive and covered many aspects of the apprenticeship that employers may not share in their adverts, which was helpful. Lauren also talked about how you can still earn a degree and gain experience in job, which would be the ideal. Overall, it was a relaxed talk which was informative and useful as she had much common ground with us, year 13s". (Mia H)



Year 13 Law Applications and Pathways UCAS with Q&A Ms A Jhaj

This term, Year 13 had an opportunity to attend an afterschool Law UCAS focussed Q&A, with a Durham Law graduate, Ms Jhai.

The students were engaged and asked probing questions which enabled a better understanding of the UCAS process and pursuing a pathway in Law. The following examples are of student feedback of the valuable opportunity:

"I found the law UCAS after school session extremely useful. I found it refreshing to talk to someone closer to my age about what university and personal statements should include. I found the advice about how to select universities extremely useful. I also found new avenues to conduct further research for the My Cambridge application, where I used an article from a recommended book. It was so useful as it helped form my application and gave an amazing insight overall into universities". (Haleena Benning)

"I found the law talk after school very beneficial. Miss Jhaj highlighted the rewards of studying law, but also the cons which gave me a realistic understanding and only made me want to study law more. She also kindly offered her revision techniques on how she gained such high A level grades which have given me insight on trying new revision methods. Her advice on writing a unique personal statement has also given me guidance on what to steer clear of which will definitely prove useful. I thank her for offering her time to enlighten us on her path of studying law as it has really helped me". (Ridhima P)

Bar Mock Trial

This week in preparation for the Bar Mock Trial the Law department had experienced barrister Shelly Glaister Young run a mentoring session with Y12 Law students. The session involved Shelly prepared by providing tips and tricks on what viewpoint to take for both the prosecution and defence in the trial. The first heat of the Bar Mock Trial will be running in January 2023.





Data Structures and the Synonym Problem

Year 12 Computer Scientists have been exploring data structures and their associated properties as part of their A Level studies. When entering their lesson this week, the students were met with a simple task... describe the data structure on their table using a single word or phrase. The aim was to get the students exploring the interweaving and ever-changing connotations of language and terminology within this unit of study.







STARTER

EXT – Where else, aside from the example given, would we see this data structure?

The students began this task timidly, with many unsure of how to describe the stack of books piled up in front of them, but after a few brief paired discussions the conversations and ideas readily began to flow. The images below show the structures and their analysis on the book stacks, which they took great pride in fashioning in the final few minutes of the task.

Throughout the remainder of the lesson the students were met with a variety of functions which can be carried out on a stack data structure and many used the starter book stacks to actively try out these methods. This real-world demonstration enabled all students to actively participate and develop their understanding of these structures.

By the end of their 5-minute activity the students had not only managed to accurately and carefully construct a wide range of synonyms for the data structure (stack), but had also been able to identify where this has been seen and used in everyday life.

School Council

Year councils have been meeting over recent weeks to discuss their impressions of ongoing changes in the school. The councils discussed how much they are finding challenge in different lessons, menu items in the cafeteria and the new improved behaviour systems. Lots of positive discussions occurred throughout all year groups. Students reported seeing increased use of teaching and learning devices commonly used across the school, such as retrieval practice, knowledge banks and no hands up. Many students also reported loving our reinvigorated Personal Development lessons, saying they enjoyed the ability to have more discussions and highly valued being with their tutor for these sessions, building on the positive relationships already in place.

This week, the whole school council met, with representatives from across different year groups. Representatives shared the views of their year groups and discussed where they feel the school is now and how they would like us to continue to develop. Students were very positive about our move to the new classcharts system, really valuing the discussions this is enabling with family about their successes in school. They were also really impressed with the lengths staff had gone to in order to improve the atmosphere around the school site, seeing the impact of more staff being on duty and an increase in security cameras. Students also discussed ways that they would like to improve the school site, how best revision can be supported and their preferred method of reward.

The school council will continue to meet each term and we will be updating all students on actions arising via assemblies and future blog posts.
