Our Religious Studies, Philosophy and Ethics Club, ExploRE, examined the life of Adolfo Kaminsky, who recently died at the age of 97. At just 17 years old, Adolfo had already become a master forger admiringly known as 'the Technician.' Working as part of a French Resistance group called 'La Sixiéme' he created convincing identity papers which enabled 10,000 Jews to escape Nazi occupied France to safety. Adolfo's story provided a conduit to examine moral decision making in different contexts as students considered his actions, their intentions and consequences during WWII in comparison with those later in his life where he used his skills to forge documents for some violent groups and for young Americans hoping to avoid the Vietnam draft.

Years 7, 8, 9, and 10 all had Holocaust lessons in Religious Studies during the week of Holocaust Memorial Day, where they explored some of the extraordinary circumstances which ordinary people found themselves in during the Holocaust and how they chose to respond. Students in Year 9 wrote a home learning piece on the theme of 'Ordinary People' (either a poem, story, prose, article, or speech). Year 7 students wrote a poem inspired by the testimony of their chosen Holocaust survivor. We will publishing a selection of students' writing on the school website soon.

Commemorating Holocaust Memorial Day 2023

To mark Holocaust Memorial Day 2023 on 27th January, students at Holcombe attended a special assembly exploring the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust's theme for this year of 'Ordinary People'. In the assembly students learned about genocide and identity-based persecution and how they continue to impact on and destroy lives. They looked at examples of ordinary people's actions and their impact during the Holocaust and subsequent genocides, including those who were victims, perpetrators, bystanders and rescuers; and considered how we can all reflect on our choices, and use them to uphold the rights of ordinary people.



National Apprenticeship Week (6th-12th February)

Our PD classes have included facts about careers pathways including apprenticeships, and we would like students and parents to be well informed of the current options available when leaving school.

Next week, students can sign up for a range of live online events and find out about apprenticeships here: nationalapprenticeshipweek.co.uk. These include information about careers in MI5, National Rail, Ministry of Defence, BAE Systems, PricewaterhouseCoopers and many other financial, engineering and construction pathways. We would encourage signing up to at least three of these live events during our half term to gain a wider insight into the transforming life opportunities your education has prepared you for.

Our students chose to do this as it increases their confidence in public speaking, looks great to add on as an extra -curricular activity on their personal statement and ties in with the criminal law topic which is being studied currently for their A-Level. The students that took part found this to be an invaluable experience and a competition they would take part again in the future.




- You must invent a brand new product in the field of technology to present to the Dragons as a single sided flipchart poster in order to win a prize!

Success Criteria


- Create an invention in the technology field

We had the pleasure of welcoming Harry Ashby for his work experience week at the Royal Engineers Museum. He spent the week getting an idea of the different roles in a museum, including collections care and management, exhibitions and engagement, digitisation and photography, and marketing, events, and social media. He learned from each of our small team about the daily tasks in a workplace, and the unique aspects of working in a museum.

As Harry has a keen interest in military history, we enjoyed pulling some archival material from the Peninsular Wars and showing him the armoury. But we also put him to work. He catalogued an item for our archive using our collections database. He also began to build a list of medal descriptions for us to hopefully use in an interactive in the future. He scanned images for our catalogue and helped take photos for our social media. We hope the week offered Harry a chance to see what a career in museum may be like, and wish him the best for the future.

I have a brilliant week at the Royal Engineers museum, observing and helping their day-to-day activities. All the staff and volunteers were friendly and knowledgeable, and I learnt plenty from them. It was such a splendid week and I had such a lovely time that did not want it to end, however I hope in the near future to volunteer.

- Monday I was introduced to the Office staff, with small meeting with the Director of the Museum. Afterwards, I was given the task of – after being shown and having a manual – cataloguing a Peninsular War guide. This I completed for the remainder of the day.
- Tuesday In the morning, myself and a Visitor Services Assistant wandered the exhibitions, exchanging facts and knowledge and sharing our passion for Military History. The Collections Officer then showed me the Archives Room a wonderful place where we both looked at various documents, for example Lt-Col Fletcher's letters to Wellington concerning the Lines of Torres Vedras. A very exciting moment for me. In the afternoon, I went n another tour with the Visitor Engagement Officer who explained to me what the Museum's plans were for later improvement of exhibitions. I was also given, which I deem to be an honour, the task of starting a record for every British Army medal, to be continued by other Work Experience students and which will eventually be on display in the Medal Rooms.
- Wednesday For the morning I observed the team in transporting General Gordon's map into a custom-made box for transportation, seeing first hand the dedication Museums have in the safe transportation of their Collections. Afterwards, the Collections Officer and I walked around the exhibits, measuring the Collections' temperature and humidity, as well as checking the peat traps. Also, we had a discussion on the ten agents of deterioration. Continued the medals records after lunch, before the Collections Officer took me to see the Objects Archive, again a wonderous place.
 - Thursday I spent most of the day in the Scanning Room with the Digital Collections

 Access Officer, where I scanned and wrote the captions for a photo album of Palestine
 in 1936. It was amazing to be so close and personal with an incredible piece of history.

 For some of the remaining afternoon, I with much help and support edited the scans
 on a computer website.
 - Friday I spent the morning with the Commercial and Operations Assistant, who showed how the Museum's website is ran and how to attract visitors. Just before lunch, the Collections Officer and Visitor Engagement Officer showed me the Armoury, where I was able to hold multiple guns, swords and even four original Victoria Crosses definitely a brilliant way to end the week. In the afternoon I have a discussion about Marketing, and continued the medals record.



7G rounded off this term's topic of poetry by creating their own shape poetry. By reflecting on the skills and stories they have encountered across the year so far, they endeavoured to use a specific form to produce thoughtful and creative pieces.



Thinking outside the (padlocked) box in Religious Studies

The Year 10 GCSE Religious Studies students who were not taking part in Work Experience last week developed their problem-solving, creative thinking and team working skills through an escape room activity during their lesson. Each team had nine padlocked boxes with a series of clues which required them to work together and use what they have learned so far in the GCSE course to solve riddles and crosswords, identify incorrect statements and analyse pictures to obtain the code for each padlock. The objective was to collect the maximum number of points tokens by opening as many boxes as possible within the time. It was a closely fought contest between the teams, with each unlocking the final padlock only moments apart. Their teacher, Miss Cook, was particularly impressed with how well the group members collaborated, and their recall of the Bible verses they had learned through dual coding where the verses were paired with pictures.

Students' thoughts on the activity were:

"I enjoyed how we all cracked codes cooperatively other than doing each individual task ourselves. By doing it simultaneously it aided us to save more time and get through most of the questions with a constant pace. This enabled me to recall an array of topics we did before." Kias

"I liked the different puzzles that we had to do and how we didn't just use our past knowledge but we also had to use other some other skills." Alex

"I can't lie - it was really fun, like trying to crack the question related codes, for example the ones that asked us questions in which the answers were numbers. I think the fact we were racing as well made it a lot better as well. I had to apply knowledge from past lessons to answer some of the questions." Clinton

"I enjoyed how the task was able to involve everybody and their qualities into a team building activity. It also enabled me to apply past knowledge and recall past topics with imagery. It also enabled us to think interdependently as well as to co-operate with each other." Michael

We hope to run a similar activity for the whole class at the end of the next major unit of work.

art and an artist can be - even in the most 'random' ways. Our interaction was the highlight of my year. I am grateful to you Gurshaan. * Thank you to all my






