
### **Year 12 Apprenticeship Fair**





### **Personal Development**

We have explored how to access further support from outside agencies and how to support one another in social situations to make the safest choices and actions. Open Road is a local Medway charity which offers lots of information and support on substance use. ### **Book of the Week**

From killers to conservationists, Carnegie-shortlisted Chris Vick tells the story of three generations of the Kristensen family, their history as whale hunters and later their mission to save the great whales and our planet. Summer, the Present

Fiery and fierce, computer geek and eco-activist, Abi is holidaying with her grandmother on an island off the Norwegian coast. Having developed and befriended an AI device, Moonlight, she hopes to organise a global protest.

On the island, she learns her great-grandfather rejected the family's whaling livelihood, instead creating the first whale song recording. Inspired by him, Abi and Moonlight translate the whales' songs and discover their stories. Whales are under threat, their numbers rapidly dwindling. Abi is determined to help.

**Autumn, 30 years later:** The world's ecosystems are collapsing. There is no sight or sound of whales. Abi, her daughter, Tonje, and a now almost conscious Moonlight live on an isolated island in the Atlantic. They search for any sign of whales, but so far there is only silence.

Winter, the Future: Tonje's search was not in vain. Despite climate crisis and the threat of extinction, there is always hope for the future, as nature and technology combine in a captivating, action-packed adventure with a powerful environmental call to arms.

#### Potential Year 9 GCSE Media Students

Prospective Year 9 GCSE Media students had the opportunity to attend a Q&A session this week, which was organised by Bafta and IntoFilm as part of National Careers Week. The Q&A was with Simon Stanley-Clamp, a Visual Effects Supervisor, with over 40 credits to his name having worked on films such as Matilda the Musical, Avengers: Endgame and the Harry Potter films!

Simon began by explaining his role and the work that he does, explaining that he is involved in every stage of production allowing him to travel the world with film crews. He explained to the students what the difference between special effects and visual effects is and explained what was involved in each stage of production of a film. Simon then explained what skillset would be required for working within a visual effects role explaining that a variety of skills were needed such as technical skills of coding or programming, as well as creative skills such as animating or life drawing.

In the Q&A session, the students came up with a range of questions to ask Stanley including asking what types of software were used for visual effects and what examples were there of when visual effects didn't work, where Stanley explained that a controlled explosion went off too early and they had to colour in thousands of pieces of polystyrene on a computer. One student asked if the skills needed for visual effects in film were transferable to other industries such as video game designers, to which Stanley said absolutely and explained that the creative industries are one of the fastest and largest growing industries in the world but an industry which is struggling with a skill shortage.

Overall the students enjoyed the session and hopefully have been motivated by the opportunities available within the creative industries.




