#### **Year 13 Student Finance Talk**

On the 14<sup>th</sup> March, 150 of our Year 13 students had a speaker from the University of Kent come in and talk to them about student finance and how it works when applying for University.

Applying for finance is the next stage for our students in their journey to university, this can be quite a difficult process for some students, and it is down to the students themselves to arrange.

The talk took place in their personal development lesson meaning all could attend, which was helpful, and gave the students a valuable opportunity to understand more about the process and to ask any questions that they might have.

The same talk was offered in the evening for Year 13 parents, as parents may have questions about student finance and how it works and needed to know their role in the process and any expectations of them, some may not have gone through the process before and as with everything things change over time.

We had a good response to this with well over a quarter of parents attending.

## **DofE Bronze Qualifying Expedition**

Well done to the 33 students from Year 10 who all took part in the Bronze Qualifying Expedition over the weekend 17 -19 March 2023. All five groups on the venture performed well and took the torrential rain on Saturday in their stride. All the groups where strong showing good navigation skills and teamwork over the course of the weekend. The students' performance on the expedition is encouraging for the future with Silver DofE enrolments taking place after Easter. I hope that many of these students will sign up for the next level of the Award. Can I also say a big thank you to the staff that helped out over the weekend as the expedition could not run without them, Mr Campbell, Miss King, Mr Rayner, Miss Wilson and Mr Zygmant.

#### **Sixth Form Biology Trip to Wakehurst Place**

On Friday 17 March 2023, 28 of the Year 13 Biologist went on a Biology Field Trip to Wakehurst Place, the Sussex annex of the Royal Botanic Gardens Kew and the home of the Millennium Seed Bank. The student spent the day completing two workshops on DNA profiling and Woodland Ecology. The students had to put their knowledge of DNA profiling into practise with a practical activity where they had to identify the DNA profile that they had generated of plant material impounded by HM Customs and Excise. Did it contravene the CITES rules? After lunch the students completed the second of the workshops on woodland ecology by completing an ecology sampling activity to look at the conservation of coppiced woodland and how coppicing leads to increased biodiversity. The students also managed to squeeze in a talk and tour of the Millennium Seed Bank where Kew keeps an underground collection of over 2.4 billion seeds from around the world, banking them to conserve them for the future. The day at Wakehurst was a useful and enjoyable day for the students but was only made possible by the staff that attended the trip and made the day run so smoothly.





#### **Peace Computational Art**

Students in Year 8 have been focusing and developing skills in relation to digital images and the tools used to create these. Students have been using Inkscape — a free piece of software — that allows anyone to learn the editing, creation and manipulation skills used within the media industry.

As the practical part of their end of topic assessment, students in 8Ar were asked to create a piece of digital artwork that represented their interpretation of peace. As can be seen from the sample of work below, these students rose to the challenge producing some mindful and well-developed pieces.

Well done 8Ar!





#### **MFL**

## **Personal Development**

As we complete our fourth term of weekly Personal Development lessons, we have welcomed numerous volunteers and visiting speakers to cover different themes of the PSHE curriculum.

Year 7 met David, an ex-student of our school who now works for Kent Fire & Rescue Service to discuss how to stay safe and avoid dangerous situations with fire. Year 10 spoke with a local River Thames RNLI crew member to learn about water safety and strategies to keep one another safe. You can find more information and the opportunity to contribute to this charity at RNLI - Royal National Lifeboat Institution - Saving Lives at Sea.

Years 11, 12 and 13 have used a STEM learning focus to understand the impacts of nutrition, sleep and alcohol using their science and mathematics skills. Their calculations enabled students to understand the influence of lifestyle choices on health and well-being.

Two of our Year 12 students, Megan and Ryan, produced some lessons and filmed their own instruction videos on First Aid to share with years 7, 8 and 9 students. They demonstrated CPR, using a defibrillator and using the recovery position, which students practiced in class with CPR manikins.

Year 12 got together with a team of Medway school nurses who explained aspects of sexual health including STIs and were offered advice on testing and self- care.
