## YEAR 8 ARTIFICIAL CREATIONS






# YOUNG PROFESSIONALS X CITY CENTURY LEGAL WORK EXPERIENCE



Young Professionals x City Century Legal Work Experience was offered to our Year 12 and Year 13 Law cohort. We had 13 students from Holcombe Grammar School attend. This was a calling all aspiring legal professionals, solicitor apprentices and anyone who's considering a career in Law. Students were able to experience panel discussions, hear some inspiring keynote presenters, as well as have plenty of opportunities to network and build up their personal legal connections.

This was an in-person Work Experience Day which took place on Wednesday 25th October at the prestigious Queen Elizabeth II Centre in the heart of London!

Young Professionals teamed up with City Century which is a collaboration of over 50 leading London law firms which all came together to provide invaluable insight events, work experiences and solicitor apprenticeship opportunities for students.

Never before has the legal industry seen so many law firms all coming together with a mutual goal - to help students find out how to secure their dream jobs within a City law firm! This was our students' chance to be in the same room as some of the senior leaders at each of these incredible law firms to learn from their experiences, ask questions, network and ultimately take the first step to secure their dream profession.

Below are some statements from a few of our student's who attended the event:

Adam Fletcher – Year 12 - The whole event was very well organised, especially with over 3000 students attending in 1 day. We were all provided with pens, paper, a list of 40+ law firms who attended the event. The event was very heavily focused on promoting the route of a solicitor apprenticeship as an alternative route to university, which was not something I wanted to do however, now I would definitely consider it as a plan B for my future. They gave lots of information on the benefits of this route, such as the fully funded degree, and the guaranteed 2-year training course. Every speaker who was on a panel at the event had a great reason to be there and had clearly earned their position which was inspiring, especially since some of them were part of the very first cohort of Solicitor apprenticeships, such as Holly Moore. I would recommend the event to anyone considering this career path.

Naomi Omisore – Year 12 - I found the experience at the city century law event to be helpful because it gave me knowledge about degree apprenticeships as an alternative to just doing a university degree. I was able to meet new people at the event who were really friendly and kind. There were law firms, and Solicitor Apprentice's I was able to talk to and hear from. I even managed to add one of them on LinkedIn and ask follow up questions

## SIXTH FORM ASPIRING PILOTS



On the 17th of October, 3 of our A-Level students aspiring to pursue careers as potential pilots had the opportunity to speak to ex-student, Sam Barnard, who is now a pilot himself, working for easyJet. Thomas and Peter (in year 13) are currently mid-way through their application process with British Airways Speedbird Pilot Academy. After sitting an assessment day at Heathrow last week, speaking with someone who has gone through the process made the students feel this time was very valuable in gaining the right information about the sort of training involved, how they can best prepare for the upcoming assessments, as well as the day-to-day responsibilities of flying commercially. At the same time, Hayden (also in year 13) aspires to join the RAF, this was insightful for him to see that in the future, there is the possibility of going from military to civilian flying. Thomas, Peter and Hayden would like to thank Sam for his time and knowledge and spoke of how useful it was to speak to someone in the profession.





Can I ride my e-scooter to school or work?

No, it's Illegal...

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It's not possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them.

Can I ride my e-scooter on the pavement?

No, it's Illegal...

You cannot use e-scooters on public footpaths, cycle lanes or roads.

What happens if I'm caught using my e-scooter in public spaces?

The scooter may be seized and as a result, destroyed.

If stopped by an officer, you may be asked to complete a breath and drugs test. You also risk a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for no insurance.



### Think before you buy:

The number of electrical scooters being used on our streets has risen, as well as reports of serious injury and fatalities.



Upon the High Street is a photography project shot in collaboration by award-winning Medway-raised artists Joshua Atkins and Daniel Loveday.

The project focuses on Chatham High
Street and the surrounding area, capturing
the essence of the people and landscape
whilst celebrating the town's history and its
diverse residents. The photographs reflect a
continually adapting environment, especially
as online shopping and next-day delivery
changed the shopping experience, with this
alongside an influx of diversity reshaping these
spaces across the UK.

The two photographers made frequent trips to the area, where they engaged with, photographed, and ultimately became intertwined with the lives of shoppers, workers, and residents. Through the repetition of these visits, a profound sense of shared experience emerged, solidifying their integration into the very heart of this ever-changing community.

"When you walk the same streets back and forth, you notice things you may not have picked up on before, like the historic building fronts or how the High Street spaces are made of pockets of different communities. It's fascinating to both observe and document these changes from two viewpoints, especially as the High Streets across the UK rapidly evolve and adapt."

We understand how difficult it can be when energy bills start to rise. By making some small, simple changes we can all save money while staying safe and well.

#### Save money when cooking

When cooking, put a lid on your pan as this can save you money on your energy bill. Putting a lid on your pan allows water to boil faster and the lid keeps the heat in the pan, rather than letting it escape, speeding up cooking time and helping you use less energy.

Slow cookers save money! Slow cookers are an extremely efficient way to cook, you can batch cook meals. Likewise, microwaves and air fryers are also great alternatives to using ovens.

#### Switch off your appliances

Turning off lights and switching appliances off standby when not in use can save  $£85^1$  a year on energy bills.

#### Do not over fill

Only boil as much as you need, overfilling your kettle wastes energy.



#### Turn down your thermostat

By turning down your thermostat from 22°C to 21°C, you could save £115<sup>2</sup> on your energy bills.

Wash on eco or 30°C or cooler cycles when you can. Washing at 30°C rather than higher temperatures could save £15³ a year

#### **LED lights**

Switch your lights to energy-friendly LED light bulbs. Replacing all the light bulbs in your home with LEDs can save around £65<sup>4</sup> a year, lasting five times longer.



Only wash with a full load, cutting back on just one washing cycle a week can save you an additional £15 a year and further savings on metered water bills.



#### Use a washing bowl

Using a bowl to wash up rather than a running tap can save you money on your energy and water bills if you have a water meter. You only need to run a typical tap for 95 seconds before you would have filled a washing up bowl.<sup>5</sup>

#### Take shorter showers

Spending just one minute less in the shower can save £20 a year in a typical household and uses far less energy than taking a bath. Sticking to 4-minute showers could save a typical household £75 on energy bills and around £65 on metered water bills every year.<sup>6</sup>

Replacing an inefficient shower head with a water-efficient one can reduce your yearly gas bill by £45. If you have a water meter as well, you can save another £25 – that's a total saving of £70 each year.<sup>7</sup>
