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Course Outline



Component 1 Performing

2 performances
30% of final grade

Solo performance - minimum 1 piece and minimum 1 minute
Ensemble performance - minimum 1 piece and minimum 1 minute

Together total minimum of 4 minutes across the solo and ensemble pieces

Component 2 Composition

2 Compositions
30% of final grade

1 Set brief – minimum 1 minute
1 Free Composition – minimum 1 Minute

Together total minimum of 3 minutes

Component 3 Listening and Appraising test

1 hour and 45 minute
exam
40% of final grade

The exam is based on 4 Areas of Study with 2 Set Works each:

- Area 1: Musical Forms and Devices
- Area 2: Music for Ensemble
- Area 3: Film Music
- Area 4: Popular Music



Links to other subjects

Many of our students choose to study Music with other Arts subjects such as Art and Media Studies but can also have links to other subjects including Maths through the use of patterns; Science through the understanding of how pitches are created and manipulated; and English through the structuring of melodies and songs.

We recommend that you are taking Music with another essay based subject to further refine your skills in structuring excellent answers that are effective in applying knowledge, accurate in detail and draw on continuous knowledge taught throughout your lessons in preparation for the exam.



Holcombe Habits



- Wonder and awe is developed through the continual layering and gathering of new knowledge about music from a variety of styles and periods.
- Persisting is developed through practicing for your solo and group performances and creating and developing your compositions.
- Creative thinking is developed through your compositions and your performances.
- Continuous learning is developed through the constant addition, development and expansion of previously gained knowledge about different styles of music and the use of this knowledge to compose and perform your music.
- Taking responsible risks is developed through the creation of your compositions and your performances.

- Have good organisation.
- Have perseverance and enthusiasm.
- Be creative.
- To be able to meet deadlines.
- To work independently and with others.
- To have effective communication skills – from active listening, oral and written communication, and your ability to work as a group to perform music.
- To have good time management skills.
- To be able to listen to and evaluate a variety of types of music.
- To be dedicated to learning an instrument.
- To have the discipline to practice and improve your performance and compositions.
- To have an inquisitive mind-set.
