

Holcombe Habits



- Continuous leaning is developed through the constant addition, development and expansion of previously gained knowledge. For example, learning about the local, national and international communities we have preconceived ideas about and exploring the sociological theories, research findings and collection of social facts into understanding the commonalities and differences between and within cultures and societies.
- Questioning and posing problems are developed through learning about social policy and empirical
 evidence researching social phenomena, ranging from criminal statistics to the impact of cultural capital in
 education. Identifying, analysing, evaluating and questioning the social research for validity and reliability
 and the extent to which the conclusions are generalisation to wider social issues.
- Wonder and awe is developed through the continual layering and gathering of new knowledge about communities, cultural differences, rituals and social mores. Developing a sense of curiosity by recognising the commonalities between societies, inequalities between social groups and the challenges they weather, recently in a global pandemic.











Skills needed to succeed in Sociology



- Have good organisation and time management.
- Have perseverance and enthusiasm to learn a whole new subject area, including a new vocabulary.
- To have good cognitive skills non-routine problem solving, critical thinking and ICT literacy.
- To be able to meet deadlines and hold yourself to account.
- To work independently and with others.
- To have effective communication skills from active listening, oral and written communication, teamwork and individual presentation skills.
- To be able to interpret, analyse and evaluate quantitative and qualitative data.
- To have an inquisitive mind-set, and listen and learn of views that widen your understanding of the world.
- Have a willingness to research beyond the classroom, being an active learner.
- Have an interest in the wider world, learn about current events as they occur and conduct wider research to learn more about social issues
- Willingness to challenge your mindset of your purpose.
